As we move into fall, I trust that everyone has had a most relaxing and enjoyable summer. Since the last People's Pulpit was published, time has flown by and much in the world has changed.

Although Covid still lurks amongst us we have certainly been able to participate in more "normal" summer activities and we seem to be on an upward trajectory, although, as many of you will be aware, a few our parishioners and friends have fallen foul to the confounded virus. At St. Thomas, many activities are returning as restrictions have eased, including Coffee Hour, the successful Yard Sale in the Summer, the Corn Roast and now the Autumn Leaves Yard Sale in early October to look forward to. In addition, preparations are in hand for Thanksgiving and planning for the return of the Stittsville Santa Clause Parade, after a 3-year absence.

The repairs to the church, caused by the storm in May have been undertaken and with the help of the Diocese, the roof and spire are whole once again. Thank you to everyone in the congregation who ensured this work has been completed expeditiously.

When I was preparing to write this piece, we sadly learned that Queen Elizabeth II had died, very suddenly. In my article in June, I wrote about her strong Christian faith and her leadership of the Anglican Communion, for over 70 years. At the time, none of us realized that those Jubilee celebrations just three months ago, would be the last time we celebrated her leadership and devotion to duty.

Of course, we now have a new monarch and leader of the Anglican church, with the accession of King Charles III. With a new monarch, will that mean change for us as Anglicans and if so, how will that manifest itself? Unsurprisingly, King Charles has quickly sought to address some of these concerns and has emphasized his belief that his faith, and his commitment to duty are the principal foundations upon which he will underpin his reign. In his first address as King, he stated that the Anglican Church has greatly influenced his faith and helped him learn about the "heart of genuine service to others" and that faith, through the Church, has also inspired a "sense of duty to others". I'm sure we all share and cherish those values.

Financial Results

It's been an exciting summer, with lots of work and goings-on as a result of the spring storm. Church repairs, yard clean-up, and a delayed yard sale have all now officially been completed.

Unfortunately, the results this far are not what we would like to have accomplished.

August ending results:

 Total Incomes
 109,320

 Total Expenses
 129,000

 YTD defecit

This is about \$3,000 behind budget, but that result is driven primarily by timing variances, meaning we are still on track for the budgeted \$10,000 deficit this year.

This result is obviously not what we hoped for, but was somewhat predictable given the inflationary pressures, disruptions due to the storm, and slower than expected growth in the congregational givings.

While this may not seem like much to be thankful for, we must come to terms with this reality - we have the choice to succeed or not, over the next few years.

That choice is about growing our congregation and continuing to maximize other income streams. That reality is a gift.

As of August I anticipate Rental incomes, and Parish Fundraising will meet or exceed their fairly aggressive income targets for the year - that is a pretty remarkable result.

Moreover, at the same time, donations are up compared to last year, showing the depth of Parish commitments to our community.

The only missing plank in our plan is growth.

We must find ways to add new parishioners, not primarily for monetary reasons, but because it is what we have been called to do.

We must have a plan to engage our parish community, and the wider community in Stittsville, in Ottawa, and throughout the world.

Moving together in faith, with that plan - that is what I would like to be thankful for by this time next year.


OUTREACH COMMITTEE REPORT



This is the story of Seeker, a young man besieged by the pervasive feeling that something important is missing in his life. Setting out to identify what this is, he meets a journeyman who offers to be his guide. When the journeyman suggests that perhaps it is God for whom he is searching, Seeker, a faithful member of the Church, reacts with an immediate and uncompromising denial. His guide then challenges him to explore a different road, one that will bring him beyond the orthodox teachings of Christianity. Seeker accepts the challenge and at the journeyman's request he recounts several Bible stories. After each one the two men enter into a spirited dialogue and soon their radically different views of Christianity are uncovered. Also exposed is Seeker's theological complacency when he makes it clear that he relies on the Church to provide the answers. Indeed, Seeker assumes the Church is the answer.


Gradually, with the help of his guide, he becomes aware of the profound psychological truths contained

within the Bible's stories and eventually Seeker's ever-expanding consciousness leads him to the identity of that important something for which he has been searching. **Barbara Cordukes** has long had a deep interest in religion, having studied world religions in university. An active member of the Anglican Church, she has served in many positions at both the diocesan and parish levels. SCHOOLBOX NOW WORKING TO MAKE EDUCATION POSSIBLE FOR FIRST NATIONS IN NORTHERN ONTARIO.

In 2014 and 2016 St Thomas's sent teams to build schools in Nicaragua. Sadly, due to opposition from the Nicaraguan government, Schoolbox has withdrawn from Nicaragua. The good news is that it is now focusing on building libraries and classrooms for First Nations in Northern Ontario. Below is an extract from their newsletter on progress here in Canada.

Despite the ongoing challenges that 2022 has presented, we are forging ahead with our mission of making education possible for kids and helping to address the Truth & Reconciliation Commission's call to action for equal education for Indigenous children and youth on-reserve in Northern Ontario. We are so thankful to our growing team, dedicated volunteer Board of Directors, volunteers, and monthly supporters for your investments of time, talents, and resources in keeping this little organization that could going!

We are thrilled to have completed the construction of our first major classroom construction project here in Northern Ontario - a 40 x 60' complex - that will house a large new Indigenous library, language & resource supports, and free up space in the Gaagagekiizhik & Bimose school so that a grade 8 class can be added this 2022-2023 school year. We are so grateful for the incredible generosity of each of you that contributed to this project and are really excited to share photos of the students in their new facility this fall!

As we all gear up for back-to-school in the coming weeks, we are grateful to our incredible team of Indigenous women working to re-launch the Wabuaskang lunch program which provided 2,988 lunches in 2021-2022, install 10 new mini libraries into Pelican Falls First Nations High School and open the new Kiizhik library! We would like to introduce Bernice Miel, our new program coordinator who brings a passion for Indigenous literature as the Niisaacehwan Anishinaabe Nation librarian as she is helping more communities in Treaty #3 access.

Stuart K. Hine was born in 1899 in Great Britain. In much of Stuart's earlier years he and his wife were missionaries in the Western Ukraine of Russia, where they evangelized as Christian workers and singers. In 1931, Stuart K. Hine and his wife returned to Britain and conducted gospel campaigns throughout Great Britain. During those years, Stuart published many song books and wrote many of his beloved gospel songs. Stuart retired from the active ministry but continued to publish his song books and his music and contributed the majority of his income to various missionary endeavors around the world...Stuart K. Hine's most popular composition is "How Great Thou Art," which is recognized in many polls as the number one Hymn in America. Among his other compositions are "Can There Be One," "O Savior Mine?", "Faith Is The Bridge," and "What Can Cleanse My heart?" Mr. Hine died in 1989.
