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# THE RECTOR: Rev. Lee Lambert

Friends,

I believe it's important that we regard Easter not as a time when Christ *will* rise from the dead, but as a time we remind ourselves that he *has* risen from the dead and the time is fulfilled. The Kingdom of God is at hand. Jesus, while he spoke of many things, was always speaking about His Father's Kingdom.

Looking around the world, it's easy to ask: is this it, then? Is this the Kingdom of God? Because this doesn't look like I expected. And I agree: it doesn't. That is, if you are looking for a perfect human kingdom. And you are not alone. Christians have wrestled with this for Millennia.

But I think it's important to remember that every term and standard we apply to ourselves and then to God bear only the faintest resemblance to each other: our sense of justice, forgiveness, forbearance, love are only pale, shadowy versions of God's justice, forgiveness, forbearance, and love. We have, even the greatest of us, timelines and limits in virtually everything: we only forgive so much, bear so much, give so much – and then we don't. God's Kingdom is eternal and endless. His love and his forbearance are eternal if we but turn to him and accept the Son as our savior. The tension we live in is that we enter The Kingdom here in this life and continue to be in The Kingdom past our death here on earth; we are tempted and pulled around by this life, even when our eternal life has already begun. We waste time on fears and frustrations that ultimately mean little when we consider eternal life.

I recently watched a video of a reporter following a man down the street holding a microphone in the man's face. The man was angry, tense and harassed. The reporter, focused on his job, walked hard into a lamppost, and was brought up short with an exclamation of pain. The man he was following stopped immediately and asked the reporter: "Are you alright?"

On a deep level we all understand there are very few things in this life that stand up to what is most important – life itself. To the Christian, it is eternal life. Life here is the single most important thing after our eternal life - which never ends. Our service in God's Kingdom is more important than anything in our lives. If it is not, I ask you to reprioritize. We do this by daily devotion and asking for God's daily bread, which is the Grace, he affords us to see and to do His will.

Christ is Risen. If it seems otherwise, it's because he is merely waiting for all of us to catch up and join Him.

Blessings this coming season.

### **Pastoral Care Team**

I was given two items from this team to share with you. First is Merilee Clarke's Vestry Report for the Spiritual Care Lay Visitors at the Queensway Carleton and the second is an invitation to upcoming courses for new members of the Team as well as information about a continuing education workshop for current members.

# Merilee's Report

We are called Spiritual Care Lay Visitors at the hospital. To me that sounded like big shoes to fill. But for some reason I felt called to this ministry. I have always had a shy side to me. I never know what to say in a group setting and I have real trouble making phone calls. Small talk just isn't easy for me. So, about 6 months ago, when this opportunity came up at one of our meetings, I was more surprised than anyone when I felt this was for me. There was a course to take and one or two classes and shots to get. I was shown the 'ropes' twice and then I was on my own.

I go once a week. First, I get a list of all the Anglicans who are in the hospital. I visit as many as I can, usually 5-7 patients, during my 2 hour shift (often longer). I love it!! My words seem to come naturally from the time I introduce myself to the time I leave. We talk about their families, pets, travels, problems, happy and sad times. If they want to talk about their faith, then I listen and say a prayer for them. My goal is to leave everyone with a smile on their face. I say a blessing if they want (99% say yes). When I finish the blessing, they will hold my hand a little longer, look into my eyes and say, Thank you. My goal is to leave them smiling and in God's hands.

I thank God for directing me into this ministry. I know, with God's help, that I am making a difference in their hospital stay.

There are only a few of us visiting our Anglican patients. If you want to join us, give me a call.



# PRAYER MINISTRY AT ST THOMAS

Is any sick among you? Let them call for the elders of the church and let them pray over them, anointing them with oil in the name of the Lord: and the prayer of faith shall save the sick.

James 5:14,15a

Prior to Covid we had a very vibrant prayer ministry at St Thomas.

Over the past four years we have been able to continue with our Prayer Chain as well as the 'prayers for those in need of healing' during our 'Prayers of the People' Sunday mornings.

We are now ready to resume the second half of our Prayer Ministry.

Let me reintroduce all four parts:

**PRAYER CHAIN:** There is a very dedicated team of about 15 pray-ors who commit to praying regularly for the people on our list. You can have yourself or someone you care about included by contacting Sylvi Dawes at 613-492-0218 or sylvidawes@gmail.com. Names and information are kept strictly confidential.

**PRAYERS OF THE PEOPLE**: If you wish to be included in the Intercessions during the 'Prayers of the People' on Sunday morning, you simply let Carolyn know and she will add your name.

**PRAYER JOURNAL**: Once again, we have a prayer journal just inside the entrance to the church next to the font. Names written in that journal each Sunday will be included in the Prayers of the People.

**PRAYER MINISTRY**: We are now feeling comfortable about resuming our Sunday Morning Prayer Ministry. During Communion, two members of our Prayer Ministry Team will be available to pray with anyone regarding concerns they may have for themselves or someone else. Simply, once you have received the Eucharist, come back to the little alcove on the right-hand side of the church. The curtains will be closed to allow for privacy and, again, anything discussed or prayed for will be kept in strictest confidence. On the 4th Sunday of each month, anointing with oil (a sacrament and thus performed only by a priest) will be available.

# PROJECTION TEAM – WHAT IS IT ANYWAY?

Each Sunday, and on special annual services such as Christmas, the Lenten Season and Holy Week, a visual version of the Order of Service as printed in the bulletin is presented on two screens in the Sanctuary.

This is the practice today at most churches and offers a hands-free experience to the worshipper. New members for the projection team are most welcome. Written instructions and hands-on training for projection or preparation are provided.

It is not onerous and is delightfully challenging, as each service has a distinct pattern but within it there are unique aspects as well – no two are alike!

The presentation consists of two parts – the preparation of the Order of Service using 'Easy Worship' software, then the actual showing of the service, as it mirrors the flow of the Liturgy described in the printed bulletin.

### THE STITTSVILLE FOOD BANK

The guest speaker at the January meeting of the A.C.W. was a representative from the Stittsville Food Bank, Theresa Qadri. I found this presentation very informative and enlightening. Although I am aware of the tremendous amount of new construction around the Stittsville area I hadn't considered that it might be contributing to an increase in people needing assistance from the Food Bank. That along with many other factors have contributed to a large increase in requests. As an example, she mentioned that in December 2023 the Food Bank prepared six and a half times more Christmas Hampers than they had in 2023.

Teresa also explained some of the work that the volunteers perform: checking the food donations for expiry dates, stocking shelves, and pulling the items that are requested by the clients. The Food Bank is thankful for the donations received but she did note that summer can be a time when the shelves may be rather sparse. There is usually a greater need in September as the children return to school. The Food Bank also accepts basic school supplies to help at that time.

Here is a list of the items that the Food Bank likes to have available for the clients:

# THE CHOSEN

is a Christian historical drama television series. Created, directed, and co-written by filmmaker Dallas Jenkins, it is the first multi-season series about the life and ministry of Jesus of Nazareth.

It is focused on the people who encountered Jesus and views Him through their eyes. Jenkins has stated in interviews that he sought to present Jesus in a way that was more "personal, intimate, and

immediate". It is based on the true stories of the gospels of Jesus Christ. Some locations and timelines have been combined or condensed. Primarily set in Judaea and Galilee in the first century, the series centers on Jesus and the different people who met and followed or otherwise interacted with him. Back stories and some characters or dialogue have been added. However, all biblical and historical context and any artistic imagination are designed to support the truth and intention of the Scriptures. Viewers are encouraged to read the gospels.

Reading these stories in the Bible again and again makes it easy to become detached from the fact that these were real people living real lives dealing with real struggles, going to work, hanging with friends, making jokes and eating lunch but Jenkins has brought it all to life in an engaging and relatable way. Jesus is played by actor Jonathan Roumie. He portrays Jesus with an unflinching kindness and empathy that makes him instantly relatable, trustworthy, and lovable. He says that he always aims to "empty out as much of himself as possible" to allow the Holy Spirit to work in him through both the script and his performance onscreen. In describing his preparation for the role, Roumie said that he does "a good bit of reading and rereading the source material" but that most of the preparation is "in the spiritual department".

The series had completed three seasons, and the fourth season starts this month.

A total of seven seasons is planned. This series is truly inspiring and has impacted the faith of millions of people. It brings to life the gospel stories and the people with whom Jesus interacted.

Give us your wisdom so that we might bear fruit worthy of your kingdom. In Jesus' name we pray. Amen.

### **Bible Study Guide**

#### **Modifiable PowerPoint Slides**

A Time of Prayer is a Spirit-led time of listening to how God is calling our diocesan church and parishes to cooperate with God's loving action in the world. The bible study guide and accompanying slides present a *Lectio Divina* approach to animate reflection.

*Lectio Divina* is an ancient practice in the church which combines an attentive reading and praying of a Scripture passage with periods of silence to create space for the Holy Spirit to speak to our hearts.

The guide and slides contain opening and closing prayers, the scripture passage, reflection questions to stimulate discussion and links to some brief commentaries on the passage.

Parishes are encouraged to bring together people who feel called to listen for divine sparks in their parishes and local communities to share in *A Time of Prayer*. These resources can also be used to open meetings or groups in the community such as Parish Council.

Capturing important reflections as they emerge from the monthly bible study will enable a fuller discernment as this prayer initiative unfolds, as well as facilitate participation in diocesan-wide meetings for prayer and sharing of insights.


The brief overview provides insights on the key findings about the diverse relationships Canadians have with religion and includes a link to the fuller report for more detailed graphs, charts and analysis.






