"THOSE TROUBLESOME THREE DAYS"

In the space of a little less than 36 hours God shook the world with shock waves that have not stopped reverberating for close to 2,000 years. It started on a Friday with the execution of a preacher from Nazareth. His name was Jesus. He had something of a following but by the time He was killed most had abandoned Him - even one of His closest friends denied three times that he even knew Him. This preacher was poor; he left behind no worldly possessions and he even had to be buried in a borrowed tomb. His death was not out of the ordinary - crucifixion was the usual way to dispatch the criminal and troublesome element of society.

Had the story ended there, as the shadows lengthened in the setting sun that Friday evening, Jesus would surely have slipped into obscurity. A footnote, perhaps, in a long since forgotten world.

But Jesus was no footnote and for two millennia the world has not been able to shake off the events which followed that Friday on Calvary. Even while Jesus was still on the cross, creation itself rebelled at the abomination just committed. Unseen hands ripped open the curtain in the temple exposing the inner sanctum of a religious way that would not see the Messiah in its midst. The sun was eclipsed and day became like night - the earth convulsed as its creator gasped for His last breath. Even these remarkable events might, in time, have been forgotten. The world, however, would never forget the Sunday morning which followed. When the preacher's friends came to attend to His body, hurriedly placed in a tomb as the sabbath approached, they found only an empty cave. Unexpectedly and unwittingly these friends were witness to the greatest event since creation itself. Jesus was alive. They had witnessed the resurrection.

Almost immediately the world began what we have come to know in this century as "damage control." The reliability of those who encounter the risen Jesus and witnessed the resurrection was attacked. Accusations of an apostolic plot to deceive the world by stealing Jesus' body were quickly circulated. It was even postured that Jesus had not really died - that He had indeed survived the cruelty of the cross. But the tide could not be stopped. As more and more people heard the news and as the risen Lord appeared in the days following Easter a new faith and hope was born. The Jesus whom they had heard and loved was alive and nothing in heaven or on earth could sway that conviction.

So it is, the events of those three days have troubled the world ever since. As He has done for twenty centuries the living Jesus inspires men and women in ways that frustrate and derail the values of the world. When the world promotes greed, instant gratification, and selfishness it is the living Jesus who inspires compassion, patience, and self-giving. When the world sinks in despair it is the living Jesus who stirs hope and rekindles a desire to find a new way. It is Jesus who calls us to look again at His creation and to see ourselves entrusted with a fragile entity of immeasurable beauty. It is Jesus who reminds us that in the face of every human being we see reflected the image of God. It is Jesus who teaches us that we are so precious and so valuable. How the world wishes that Jesus had just been a respected teacher, an upright and moral person, a nice guy. Had that been the case He and His ways would, in time, have faded. But those troublesome three days show Jesus to be nothing less than the Son of the living God.



NEW CHURCH DESIGN FINALIZED


Parish Council held a special meeting near the end of March, to review some contentious design issues. There have been problems trying to accommodate the Ingleside pews, without having to do major alterations. After debating several alternatives, we chose to push two 9-foot pews together to make longer pews and to move our outside aisles right to the wall of the church. This will provide a more inclusive feeling, for those who sit along the side aisles.

We also reviewed kitchen plans and chose a basic lay-out, after consulting a kitchen designer and with input from members of the choir. Finally, we discussed heating systems and voted to spend extra funds to provide gas heating instead of electrical. At the time of writing, the architect has expressed some concerns and one last meeting is planned.


GOULBOURN REFUGEE COMMITTEE REPORT;

The Goulbourn Refugee Committee met Wed. March 27 . in the Richmond library. The Committee has been formed in response to the need for sponsors for refugees from El Salvador, many of whom are church and community workers now facing life threatening situations because of their connections with the churches. As a nucleus , the committee is composed of 7 community groups, 5 local churches of various denominations , and 2 Womens Institute groups.

The decision was made on Wednesday night to fully sponsor a family group from El Salvador. This involves provision of, finances, housing, furnishings, language training, employment, education, clothing, food, health care, transportation, and social support. It is a formidable list , but with so many community groups in support , it should not be too onerous. It is hoped that the Goulbourn community as a whole will also get involved in it's usual freindly and generous manner. Many hands make light work. Initially there is a need for a co- chairman for the meetings, to take over when the present chairperson moves to Vancouver in July, also for a co-ordinator for the provisions as above. The first and greatest immediate need of the family will be housing. Anyone with the capability and desire to help with these three requests, please phone Claire at 836-4962, or at 729-8377. Perhaps someone has an apartment for rent, that they could spare for 6 months to a year?

An Interview with Emery Smith

During a recent Sunday service Emery Smith was formally thanked for his 30 years of service to our church, after he recently stepped down as Chairman of the Cemetery Committee. During the ceremony he was presented with a painting of the original St. Thomas', which was located at Stanley Corners. In discussing this painting with him Emery began to reminisce ...

Emery's grandfather moved to the area around 1865. At that time our church was still new, and he can remember folks going to church by horse drawn buggy ! Then, in 1870 came the "big fire". This fire started in Huntley Township and burned for weeks. It was finally put out at Dows Lake ! To help protect our church from falling cinders people packed the windows with wet mud, and wet down the roof. As a result of their efforts St. Thomas' was saved ! At that point in time our members were buried in Wesley United cemetery. Their plots were identified by wooden markers, which unfortunately burned in the "big fire", so peoples locations were lost.

Emery was baptised in the original St. Thomas' and he remembers it well. But, in the 1960s it was struck by lightning and partially burned. Six years after this event it was decided to sell the church, and it was thought that an auction was the best method to do this. So they got Emery to start off the bidding at \$100. As it turned out there were no other bidders, so I assume you can guess that Emery had

just bought himself a burned out church !

The original St. Thomas', Emery reminds us, was located where our cemetery is now. The entrance to the Church was located where the iron gates to the cemetery are presently. The original church had been pulled down, but Emery would like to point out that he still has the original iron steeple to our church. He says it must be some 126 years old, and he would like to donate it to be incorporated, as we see fit, into our new church ! A nice way to incorporate the old and the new.

Emery has been very active in our church. In 1938 he was the Peoples Warden, and he remembers that the cemetery grass was cut by hand for \$5 a year (and it took 2 days !). In 1947 they formed the cemetery committee, after which many improvements have been made.

Emery, we at St. Thomas' would truly like to thank you for all of your efforts over the years !!

STAY OR TAKE AWAY!

This six week program will be offered in the Parish after Easter for those who wish to have their children receive communion. Families attending a meeting on March 25th indicated a desire to follow a model of self-directed study. The rector and others would initiate the program and be available to support and assist families working through the program with their children. Please watch the weekly bulletin for information on materials being available and the date of an event to launch this program. Those interested in participating or those with questions may contact the rector.

The following are excerpts from the "Life in the Eucharist" material:

Pastoral Vision of the Program

Who are these children in our midst?

The children in our parishes are, by virtue of their baptisms, full members of the congregation. They need and desire to participate in worship. They need to have their gifts and talents recognized and encouraged. They need to know that their sorrows, concerns, and questions are heard. In short, they need to be ministered to and to have their ministry encouraged. While the Church enhances the life of children, the Church's life is also enhanced by them.

"Unless you turn and become like children, you will never enter the kingdom of heaven" (Matt. 18:3). For generations Christians have struggled to understand in what way we need to become like children. Certainly not everything a child does is commendable! Hans-Ruedi Weber, in *Jesus and the Children*, suggests that the child's vulnerability, sense of dependence, and openness to the future is what Jesus commends. There is also much that we can give children. Childhood is a precious time to be appreciated and savoured. The growth and experiences of this period continue to have a profound effect throughout the later stages of adult development. Therefore the way in which we nurture children is extremely important. *Life in the Eucharist* is designed both to nurture children and to allow adults to learn from them.

Life in the Eucharist

A Communion Program for Children

What does this program offer the child?

Sacramental preparation is a spiritual journey. *Life in the Eucharist* is therefore a special part of the ongoing moral and spiritual education of children. The program evokes their inner experiences and influences their self image and their image of God.

Two basic convictions have inspired the design of the child's spiritual journey:

- Preparing a child for the eucharist is not mainly teaching things about the sacrament. It is initiating that child into a Christian way of living and worshipping in a community. It is leading that child to discover the joy of living in communion with God and with others. The eucharist is a sacrament of love and unity. The eucharist is *agape*.

- Considering the central importance of the eucharist in our Christian faith and life, one could spend an entire year teaching about this sacrament. But this would be too much and confusing for young children. The first exploration explains the eucharist as an event through which our lives are changed when we experience it fully.

What does this program offer the parents and the parish?

Life in the Eucharist is designed to help parent and child share their faith with one another. The structure of the program and the **Parents' Guide** enables them to grow in understanding together. All too often, parents feel inhibited in sharing their faith with their child. Because this program offers concrete suggestions and support in this area, parents discover a new freedom for themselves and a deeper understanding of their own faith.

Life in the Eucharist, because it involves parent/s and children, facilitates growth in the parish. It is not children alone who are being nurtured, but families.

Planning Conference

Please plan to join us on Wednesday, May 16th, for an evening conference to discuss our new church. The plans are finished and by early May, construction should be underway. The time has come for us to get involved in the building project.

Summer is normally a relatively quiet time in the life of the church. However, 1990 will be different. With construction underway, there are various projects that need to be done.

Pete Torunski has already organized a group which will conduct regular site inspections, to ensure things are going as planned. Our stained glass windows from the original church will be removed from storage and refurbished, before being installed in the new church.

Our informal decorating committee will have to look at furnishing the various offices and classrooms and choosing colours for all the rooms. A landscaping committee will have to prepare a comprehensive plan, then encourage donations of plants and shrubs once the new building is up.

These are just some examples of how to get involved, but there are others. Our newly retrieved pews will have to be modified and re-finished, as they are moved into the new building. We also

need to find a carpenter to build a new communion rail.

At some point in the process, we will need a moving crew to start taking everything from our existing building over to the new one. We will also need to compile a list of new items, that might be suitable for memorial donations.

During this entire process, it would be helpful to have some people working on publicity, so that we have a commemorative booklet when the new church opens. We will want to plan opening festivities for the fall. Finally, we will want to look ahead to plan new procedures in our new building.

If you'd be willing to help with any of these tasks, or if you have any ideas to contribute, please come to the May planning conference. Many of us take holidays in the summer, but there should still be time left to get involved in planning our new church.



Access Fund

When planning our new church facility one of our priorities was to make it accessible to the handicapped. Consequently, the building will include an elevator, a ramp to the main door, and specially equipped washrooms.

To help finance these installations, last October a provincial grant was applied for through the Access Fund. We were gratified to receive notice that our application has been approved. The Province of Ontario will award us a grant in the amount of \$23,780, half of which will be paid during construction, and the rest to be paid when the project is completed.



NEW CHURCH CONSTRUCTION TIME TABLE

As we all know, the parish has experienced a few frustrations in the planning of our new church, because of various delays. However, we now anticipate the following timetable.

In April, we are soliciting new tenders from three construction firms, to give us updated, competitive prices. The township

is also drawing up a finalized site plan agreement, now that we have the various approvals in place.

The month of May should see the start of construction, with excavation and foundation work. Then during the summer, the building will go up, with some exterior work to our existing building. At some point, we will be able to move into the new church, so the contractor can start renovating the existing building. Although we are trying to hurry the process, let us remember that we have run into the odd delay before. The entire schedule is supposed to take five months, which would mean completion in October.

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
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


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


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
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
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
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IN EL SALVADOR



El Salvador, a small country about the size of Cape Breton, has the densest population in Central America—nearly 5 million people. A ten-year-long civil war has claimed the lives of tens of thousands, and forced more than 1 million Salvadoreans into exile or lives of extreme poverty. Many now live in Canada as refugees.

The Rev. Luis Serrano writes from prison Dec 25, 1989, "We have suffered. I was never prepared in seminary to be in prison one day, surrounded by 2-300 prisoners. But the group feels united, with a spirit of serving always. We pray together, share together, and even divide up the oranges which our relatives and friends bring us when they visit us, some with tears in their eyes. A great experience. A price which we pay in order that the Church in the near future may be stronger and greater than ever". "We ask all of you to continue praying with your hearts and pressing with your words, letters."

More recent news tell us that Fr. Luis Serrano, an Episcopal priest in El Salvador, well-known to the Canadian Church was released from prison. Upon Luis' release, he found immediate passage to Spain, where he has been recuperating from the ordeal at the home of his sister.

KEY EVENTS In 1989

- **APRIL:** Only weeks after the election, government Security police raid the offices of refugee and human rights organizations in the capital, San Salvador, arresting 75 people.
- **OCTOBER 31:** in a death-squad-style attack, a union office is bombed, killing ten people, including a prominent woman labour leader.
- **NOVEMBER 11:** FMLN military offensive begins, based in the poorest neighbourhoods of San Salvador.
- **NOVEMBER 12 to DECEMBER 15:** the government's armed forces retaliate by bombing civilians and jailing human rights and church workers. They obstruct Red Cross efforts to evacuate victims and ransack United Nations offices. They carry out a systematic campaign of raids and arrests against the Roman Catholic, Episcopalian (Anglican), Baptist, Mennonite and Lutheran churches.
- **NOVEMBER 16:** members of the armed forces savagely murder six Jesuit priests and two women at the Central American University. The Jesuits had been noted for their peacemaking efforts.

Bishop Edwin Lackey was a member of the Emergency Delegation to El Salvador Dec. 1989. He said "every person who attempts to help others is liable to be accused of being a guerilla".


